PRESIDENT RETURNS IMPRESSED WITH

SIMMENTALS

(By the President of the Australian Simmental Breeders' Association, Mr. R. W. Vincent)

Over the last four months, Lionel J. Busquets, general manager, A.B.S., Sydney, and I, have visited New Zealand, United Kingdom, Ireland, Europe and America. The purpose — inspecting Simmental and cattle breeds in general.

In New Zealand we inspected a great number of first-cross calves and were impressed with what we saw.

In England we visited both the British and Scottish Royal Shows where Simmental and Simmental infused steers were on exhibition. At Leamington I attended an International Dinner on the Association's behalf. Though only comprising 21 guests, they represented 11 countries.

I was most impressed with the Scottish Simmentals and likewise with the top of the Austrian cattle in Ireland; but I was concerned with a percentage of short, dumpy cattle and this applied to some calves purchased for export to New Zealand.

I think we have to be most discriminating in this regard and go for the growthy, stretchy animal, as we have seen what compaction has done to other breeds.

In Germany, we were the guests of Imex, the largest stud exporting company in Western Europe, and during the 10 days they were an hospitable host. We were driven through Germany inspecting Simmental and some Gelbvieh. The Breed Society's control of the Simmental breed and their planned mating programmes impressed us greatly.

We were then driven through Italy and to some of the more remote parts where few Australians would have had an opportunity of inspecting the lesser known Italian breeds of Marchigiana and Romagnola, as well as the better known Chianina. We also saw the assembled export of that breed on their way to Britain,

In France we were the guests of Count Louis D'Nauville, or Mr. Limousin as he is known in France, and had several days inspecting the Limousin breed. In all we visited 14 A.I. Centres, literally hundreds of herds and besides the better known European breeds we saw the lesser known breeds, such as Blonde L'Aquataine, and M'Aine Toure.

BASICS FROM YOUR ASBA BASE . . .

Considerable confusion still exists on the requirements for numbering base dams. In the August A.S.B.A. Newsletter on the numbering of base dams I pointed out that our register could not cope with duplicate numbers.

Unfortunately, I said that the register could cope with duplicates if the base dams were of different breeds. This is wrong. Like tag colour, the register is not designed to use this information for identifying animals. The register can only cope with duplicate numbers for base dams if their year of birth is different and is given on the insemination slips.

The fundamental requirement of the register is that every animal recorded in the register must have a unique identification number. The register combines the following five pieces of information to form the identification number of each animal.

- (i) herd designation of the owner of the animal
- (ii) herd designation of the breeder of the animal (Base dams are special in that the breeder of the animal is not required to be given for enrolment, but when it is

required the current owner's herd designation should be given.)

(iii) grade code (Base dams are all given the grade of "O" in the register.)

(iv) year code

(The old insemination slip did not collect the year of birth of base dams and where they were not given the base dams were given the year of birth code "D".)

(v) calf drop number.

Animals of different herds are identified by having different herd designations. Within herds animals are identified by having different herds of birth, year codes and calf drop numbers. (Note, all base dams are given the herd of birth of the owner.) Animals (including base dams) of different years of birth with the same calf drop number may be distinguished, but animals with the same year of birth and calf drop number cannot.

If some of your base dams have duplicate numbers on them, then please give their year of birth on the insemination slip so that they then may have different identification numbers.

If some of your base dams have duplicate numbers on them and were born in the same year then it will be necessary to extend the number so that each is recorded on the insemination slip with a different number.

Where we came in contact with Simmentals we made a point of enquiring into calving problems. The only suspect areas appeared to be in Ireland where Austrian heifers were mated prematurely to catch the lucrative American and Canadian markets, and where some of the unbelievably small traditionally bred heifers in England were put in calf and were just not capable of delivering a live calf of what would be considered a normal size. In Europe, in the pure-bred Simmental, the problem does not appear to exist.

If we have this problems in Australia, in upgrading herds, we are not going to close our eyes to it as though it is some unfashionable subject. We will be frank and open in an endeavour to come to grips with it; but remember, we are dealing with a big breed and we may be using small cows as an upgrading vehicle.

Also, we do not require prompting from the sidelines by kindred media. Our aim should be to improve our existing herds, as cattlemen with the breed that I firmly believe can do so, and not become narrow-minded in our approach.

The acceptance of Simmental throughout Ireland, the United Kingdom, United States and Canada is complete, and the prices for calves have escalated until today heifer calves a few weeks old are commanding around £5,000 sterling.

For years Hereford has been the top semen selling breed in Scotland — five months ago it was supplanted by Simmental and it has continued to progressively dominate the market. At the

Sligo A.I. Centre, Ireland (224,000 first inseminations annually), Hereford semen sales have fallen from 48% 3 years ago, to 9% last year, Simmental again taking up the slack.

The most significant highlight of my trip was the magnificent herds of Simmental females in Germany. Here, I think is the whole strength of the breed as there are many European breeds that can provide an excellent terminal cross, but I believe there is no other breed that has as strong maternal characteristics as Simmental.

I feel, for Australia, we have the European breed that has the most to offer with the least disadvantages as it is the one breed that has not gone overboard in the dangerous trend to go all out for the leanest meat regardless of the consequences.

BILLINUDGEL'S FIRST SALE

Billinudgel Pastoral Co. Pty. Ltd., Mullumbimby, N.S.W. held their first production sale of several beef breeds of cattle at Mullumbimby on Saturday, September 15, 1973.

Among the offering were seven base cows with first cross calves at foot. These sold to \$900 and averaged \$617.

Three base cows in calf to Simmental bulls sold to \$475.

One way of doing this is to record a given number at the front or the end of the number of one of the cows. If for example you had two Herefords (one with red and one with a blue tag) and one fire branded Friesian cow all identified with the number 10 and all born in the one year, then they could all be distinguished and recorded with unique identification if you added to the front of the 10 when you recorded their numbers say a "90" to indicate a red tag and a "80" to indicate a blue tag.

Thus you would record the red tagged Hereford with the number 9010, the blue tagged Hereford with the number 8010 and the Friesian as number 10

The "90" at the start of a calf drop number would indicate to you that it was a red tagged Hereford and the "80" that it was a blue tagged Hereford base dam.

If insemination slips are sent of base dams with duplicate numbers then only one of the cows can be entered in the register and have her calves registered.

This problem should not occur with calves if the A.S.B.A. regulations are followed, as, irrespective of sex, all calves born in the one year should have different calf drop numbers tatooed into their near ears.

We seek your co-operation with the numbering of base dams as delays in having your inseminations processed through the Association's Recording Register can be avoided if the numbers of your base dams are recorded correctly.

Those members who have not yet forwarded Al Certificates to enroll their herd please do so immediately. All certificates must be returned whether the cow has calved or not or if she is in calf or not. This records the number of doses of semen that have been used.

Considerable time is taken up between the enrolling of herds and the first registration of calves. While the current Al Certificates are being used for this purpose the information has to be transcribed into computer form at the R.A.S. prior to being forwarded to Armidale for enrollment.

If you have had A.I. Certificates returned to you for correction of duplicated cow, identification number or for any other reason, please oblige by returning these promptly, as your complete herd enrolment is held up until these have been amended.

transfers, also details of the dam and sire etc. as we are now ready to record these animals in a special N.Z. section of the resister.

When completing mating and calving data printouts the results of all inseminations both male and female calves, must be recorded. These male calves must also be identified with the tattoo system as laid down by the Association.

PRESENTATION OF SALE SIMMENTALS

Mr. Dougal G. Mactaggart, Southport, Old., Chairman of the Queensland Branch of ASBA, has issued a word of warning to breeders proposing to hold sales in the near future.

"The Simmental is a new breed in this countary," said Mr. McTaggart, "and apart from facing stiff competition from other breeds already in this country, has to prove itself in the eyes of the Australian cattlemen.

"I would therefore suggest that all breeders intending to hold sales should take a good, hard look at the way in which their cattle are presented.

"It is not good enough to offer a beast just because she is in calf to Simmental semen, or has a Simmental cross calf at foot. Both the dam and the calf must look the part and if they have been through a bad time, or had some health set back, they simply should not be offered.

"Eye appeal and quality have a lot to do with the acceptance of a breed, particularly when it is new to this country," Mr. McTaggart concluded.

The survey covered the calving results of cows bred to six German Simmental bulls stationed at the Scottish Milk Marketina Boards Centre.

These German Simmental bulls have proved extremely popular with Australian breeders and the above calving information will be a useful guide to breeders. Results under Australian conditions to date indicate that our percentage of assisted calvings is somewhat lower than that recorded overseas and this generally is attributed to the condition of our females prior to and at time of calving.

Semen of the Scottish Milk Marketing Board German Simmental bulls is at present in short supply but orders are being accepted by Dairy Industry Authority of N.S.W. and other Scottish Milk Marketing Board agents in all states.

The Simmental breed has met a strong acceptance in Australia and early reports confirm their rapid growth potential. This rapid growth rate coupled with their high milk production indicates that the Simmental will be a valuable contribution to the Australian cattle industry as a cross with our existing breeds.

PURE BRED SIMMENTAL TO BE OFFERED

An historical highlight in the Australian beef cattle industry will be the first ever offering of a pure bred Simmental bull at the McLaughlin Simmental sale to be held at Glen Parc, Mittagong, N.S.W. on Saturday, November 10.

This is the second annual McLaughlin Simmental sale, and apart from the pure bred bull stud and commercial breeders will be offered two half bred Simmental heifers, 15 months old, pregnancy tested in calf to Scottish Herod, 15 half bred Simmental heifers, eight months old by German Fleckvieh sires and 60 half bred Simmental bulls also by German Fleckvieh sires.

All these cattle are from top quality Hereford cows from the famous Wallamumbi and Congi

The young pure bred bull, who will be just over four months old when offered, was calved in New Zealand in the Blythe Simmental stud of Mr. R. G. Macdonald, Kaiapoi, Canterbury, on whose account he will be offered.

He is by Friarton Aaron from Stuartslaw Amy. Friarton Aaron was by one of the noted sires of the breed, Scottish Herod and although he was put straight to work at an A.I. centre on his arrival in N.Z. he still managed to achieve a 400 day weight of 1,300lb. Progress Report on Victorian Feeding Trial

Newsletter is indebted to Mr. J. E. H. Fairchild of Crieff Park Simmental, Tinamba, Vic., for the following progress figures of a Simmental calf feeding trial being carried out by Barastoc Products Pty. Ltd.

To conduct the trial Barastoc bought 12 Friesian-Simmental cross bull calves and two Friesian-Simmental cross heifers some of these being displayed at the recent Melbourne Royal Show.

Mr. Clive Scoble of Barastoc recently gave Mr. Fairchild the following progress on the feeding trial which centre around feeding calf pellets and in some cases Acme Milk Replacer as well.

The eldest three bull calves, all born on the same day and the ones dispayed at Melbourne, have shown an average daily weight gain of 3.02 lb. with the best one gaining 3.29lb. in their seventh week.

Of the other nine which are kept at the Barastoc experiment farm at Lyndhurst one lot of three had an average daily gain of 2.36in., the

next lot a daily gain of 1.76lb. in their fifth week of age and the last lot showed an average daily gain of 1.47lb., also in their fifth week of age.

It is interesting to note that as these calves pass their fifth week of age their average daily gain per day up to seven weeks of age shows an approximate one lb. per day gain in each of the two weeks.

Mr. Scoble told Mr. Fairchild he was extremely pleased with the progress of these calves. $\hfill\square$

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Sir: We think the following information may be of interest to you for the next Newsletter.

We were invited to display 3 of our first cross Simmentals at the Beaudesert Show on September 7-8 and at Beenleigh Show on September 15. We chose 1 bull and 2 heifers from our bucket fed group. The general interest shown in the breed was very good. Even large breeders of established breeds in this country, agreed the Simmentals have a good future.

We handed out a lot of the promotional material we obtained from you. In addition we made two large posters with a large numbers of pure bred bulls and cows illustrated on them. We also put progeny test charts and other breed comparisons on the posters.

Although the calves had only been handled and tied up twice before the Beaudesert Show they proved the docility of the breed by allowing children to sit on them. We thought we would have a bit of difficulty lifting 300lb. calves onto our utility to transport them, but by the third loading, to take them back on the second show day, they just jumped on. Even the next week for the Beenleigh Show they still remembered what was required.

As a further matter of interest we weigh all our calves every thirty days and so far in the past 60 days the 16 bucket reared calves have gained 1.86lb. per day and the 14 on the cows have gained 2.25lb., one particular bull calf gained 100lb. in the last 30 days.


